Guided reading is informed by Vygotsky's (1978) Zone of Proximal Development and Bruner's (1986) notion of scaffolding, informed by Vygotsky's research. The practice of guided reading is based on the belief that the optimal learning for a reader occurs when they are assisted by an educator, or expert 'other', to read and understand a text

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with clear but limited guidance.

Research Basis. Guided reading is subject to many interpretations, but Burkins & Croft (2010) identify these common elements: Working with small groups. Matching student reading ability to text levels. Giving everyone in the group the same text. Introducing the text.

In working with students in guided reading, you constantly balance the difficulty of the text with support for students reading the text. You introduce the story to the group, support individuals through brief interactions while they read, and guide them in

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talking together afterward about the words and ideas in the text.

The research revealed that, over time, many teachers began to see talk as a crucial part of their independent reading routines, as children made selections and recommendations to one another, some sharing the reading of a single comic or swapping chosen picture books part way through the time. Talking about the texts being read became the norm.
